I leave with deep appreciation - of your energy for service, your creativity in finding new ways to connect what we believe with what we do, and your faithfulness to the many ministries of this congregation.


I leave with deep prayers – for you all to grow together in love for one another and in faith that the God of all grace is leading you out and on.
